With 38 stately cabins, a clue-is-in-the-name Sun Deck and Art Deco interior flourishes, the Sun Boat IV cuts a sleek yachtish figure on the Nile. There's a massage suite for dedicated pampering, and a pool lined with daybeds and parasols for lizard-like lounging. An expert Egyptologist guide is on hand for shore excursions to legendary ancient sites, and musicians and dancers bring the country's traditions vividly to life with unforgettable onboard performances.

The Riverboat



As it gently meanders up and down the Nile – delivering guests ashore to explore the region’s great archaeological treasures up close with an Egyptologist – the 72-metre, four-deck Sun Boat IV cuts a yachtish figure. Its sleek exterior is topped by a chic upper Sun Deck, where guests cool off in the turquoise-tiled pool and lounge on daybeds shaded by parasols, ordering refreshing ice-clinking drinks from the bar service. The sense of conviviality continues indoors in the lounge bar and restaurant, where musicians and dancers entertain with spirit-lifting performances.

Refined interiors throughout incorporate natural materials, ceramic ornaments and delicately etched metalwork to add local flavor to its contemporary styling and Art Deco flourishes. The 38 cabins (all with Nile views; many through floor-to-ceiling windows) are air-conditioned and have king-size beds and ensuite bathrooms. Sun Boat IV’s facilities include a small gym with a treadmill, cycling machine and dumbbells, plus a massage room and a gift shop.

BAR AND LOUNGE

Guests can enjoy their favorite – expertly mixed – cocktails in the ample comfortable sofas and armchairs of the indoor lounge, or with the balmy river breeze in their face on the top deck.

SWIMMING POOL

The Sun Deck has shaded cabanas, day beds, and a plunge pool for blissful afternoons, plus a bar service delivering thirst-quenching drinks when the mercury rises.

EGYPTIAN BOUTIQUE

Take home tangible memories of Egypt from the onboard boutique, which sells everything from Egyptian art, pharaonic statuettes and hieroglyphic pendants to books, jewelry and jewelry boxes.

SPA AND WELLNESS

In the dedicated massage suite, choose from a range of styles, including Swedish, sports, aromatherapy and deep tissue, or have one of the expert therapists focus on hands, neck, shoulders and other areas of tension. For fitness aficionados, the onboard gym has a treadmill, cycling machine and dumbbells.

Regionally inspired design and Art Deco accents are combined to elegant effect in Sun Boat IV's 38 Nile-view cabins (including two Presidential Suites and two Royal Suites). They are spread over four decks, and many have floor-to-ceiling windows. All are air-conditioned, and all have satellite TVs, minibars, laundry service, ensuite bathrooms and king-size or twin beds. 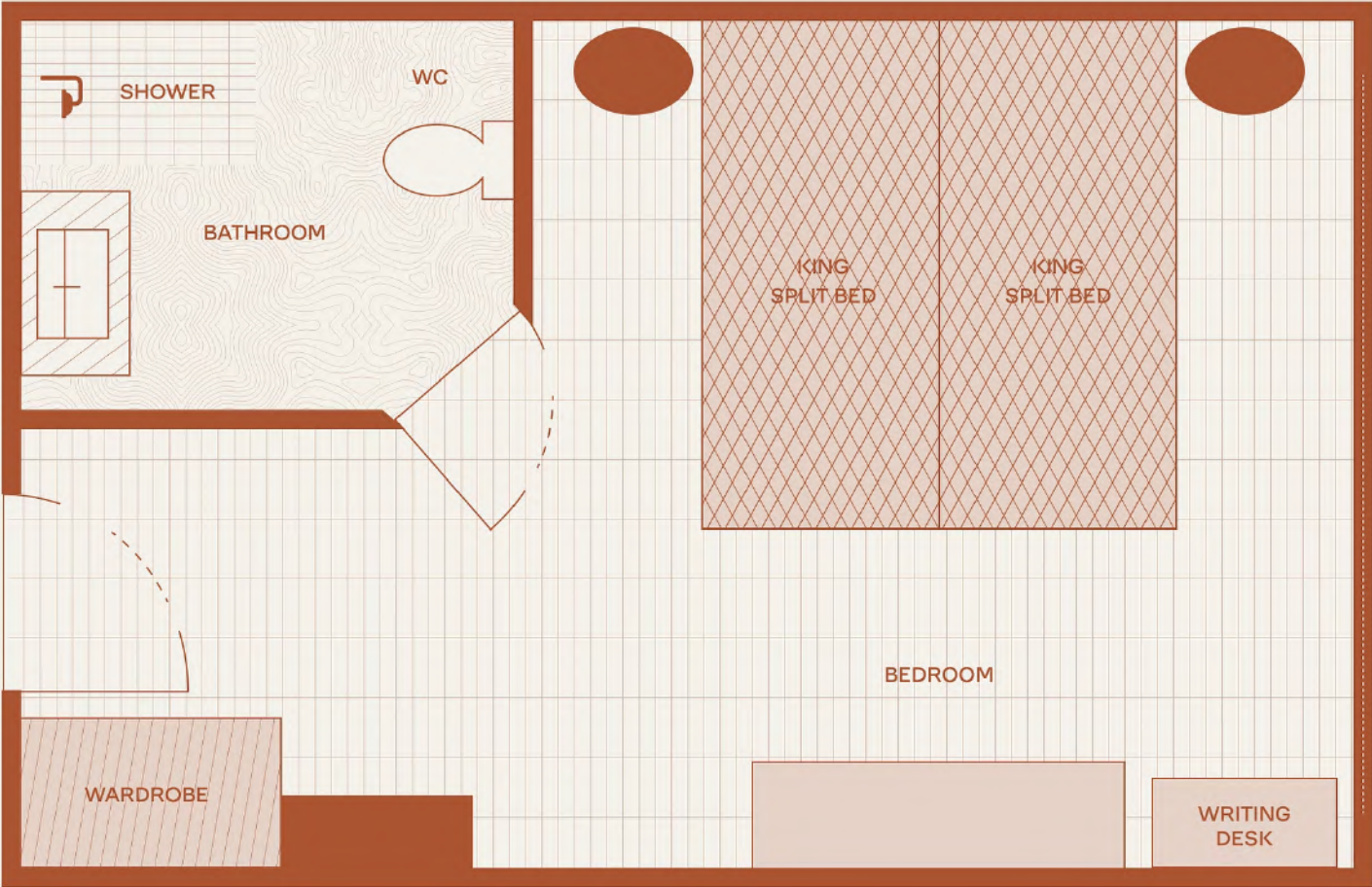

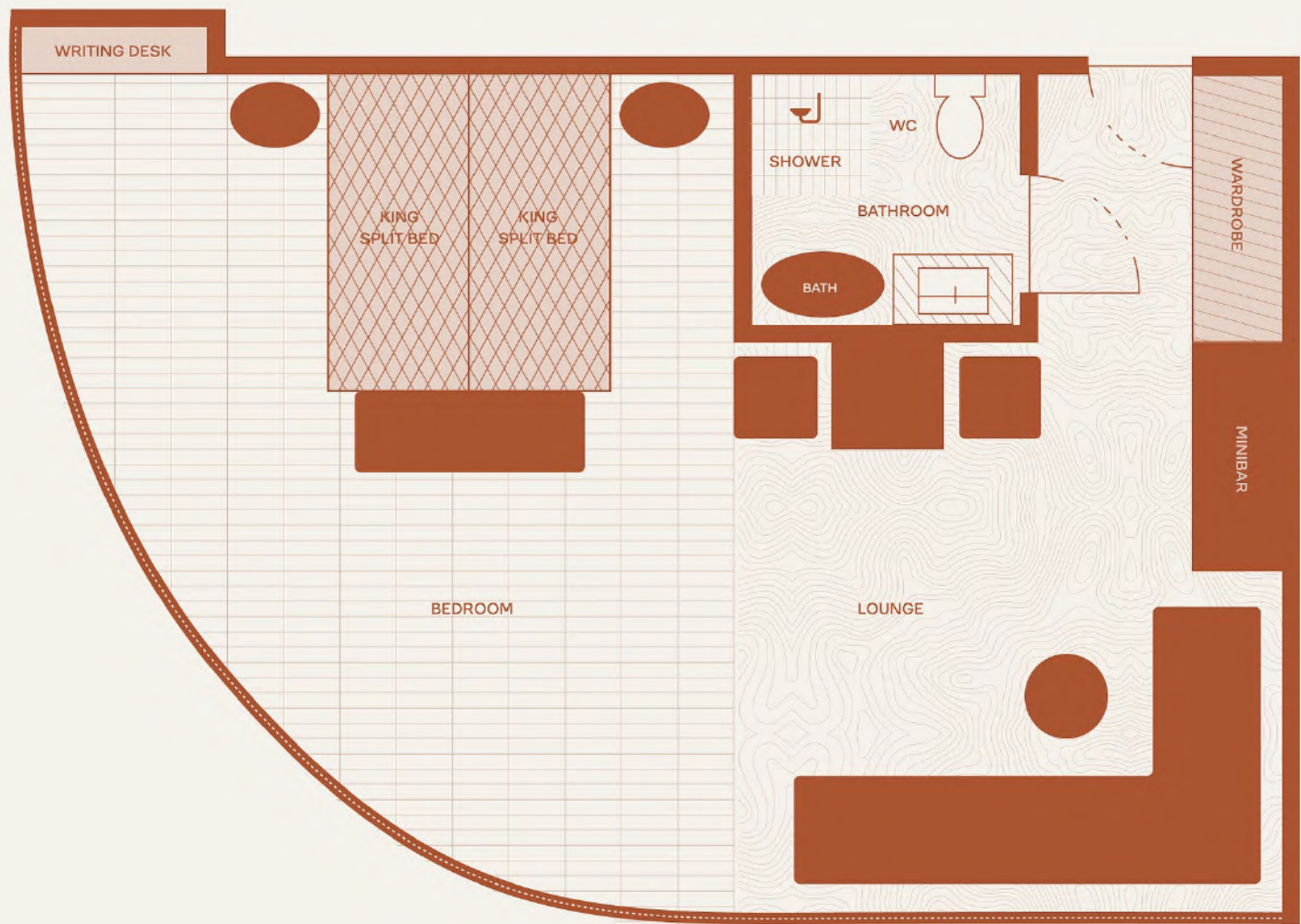


STANDARD CABIN | SLEEPS 2 | 15-18 SQ M (161-193 SQ FT)

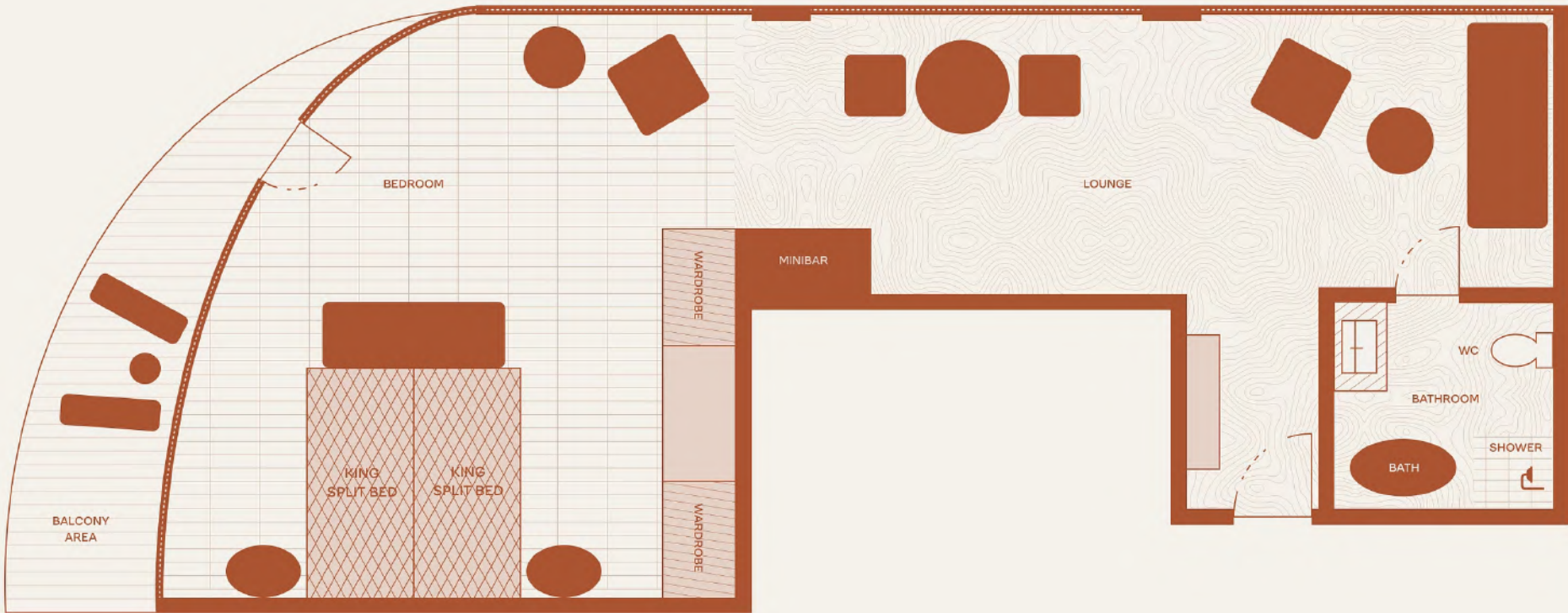

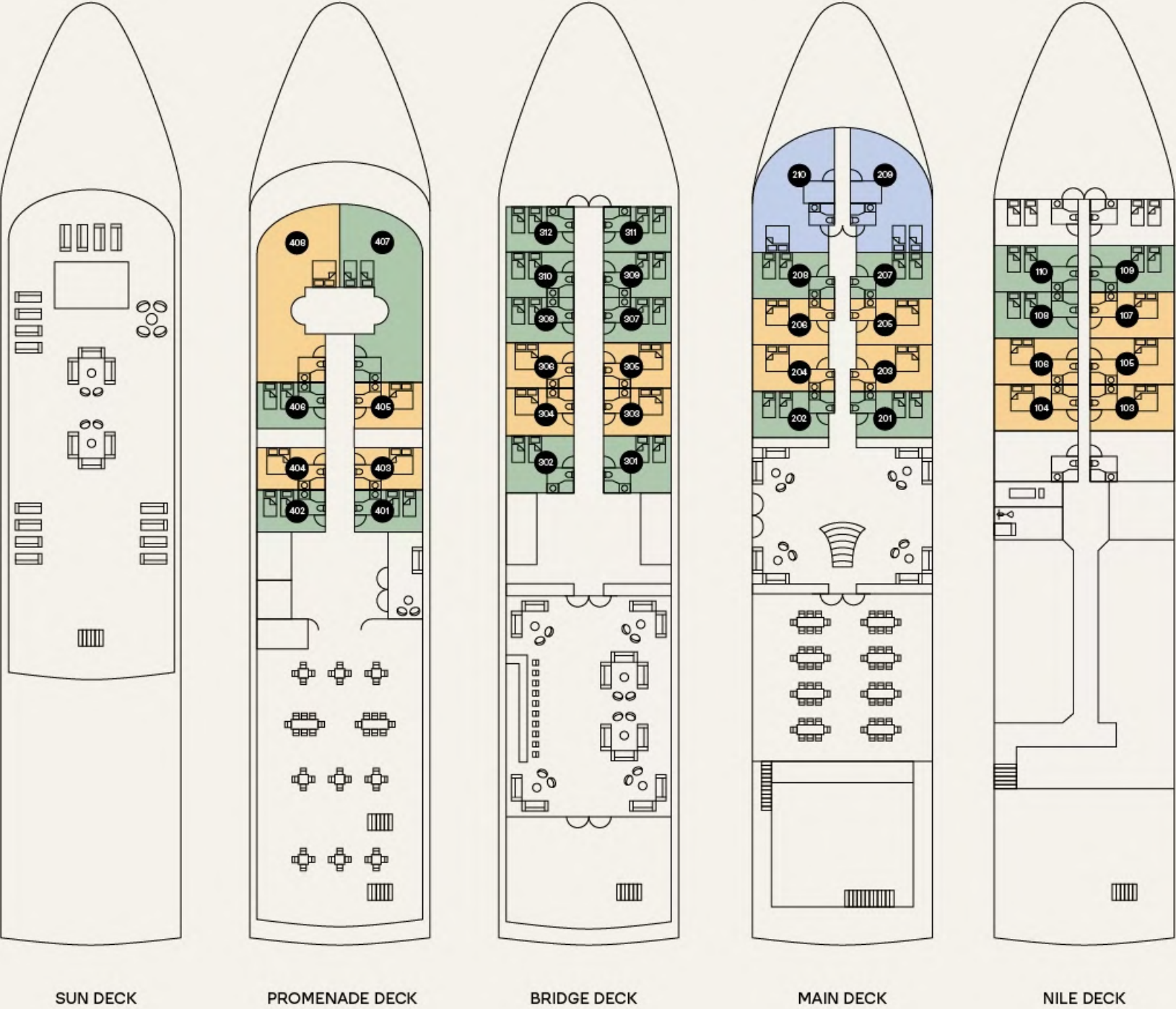

Deck Plan



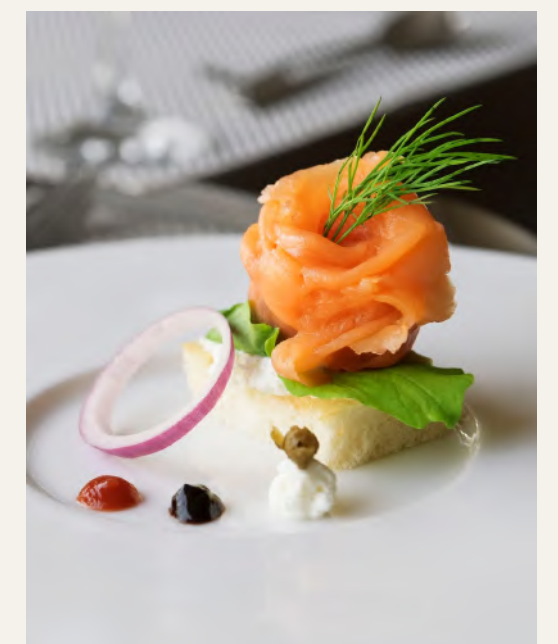
Food & Drink



Guests on board Sun Boat IV can experience local and regional flavors via the excellent cuisine. Kushari, a spicy mix of black lentils, rice and chickpeas with tomato and fried onion, is a standout dish – and those keen to take home a recipe can learn how to make it during a cookery class. Middle Eastern and international options are also available, accompanied by a carefully curated selection of wines and spirits. While the dining room is the scene of elegantly served meals three times a day, a barbecue lunch on the outdoor deck is a particular highlight. Individual dietary requirements, including fully vegetarian menus and menus for children, are expertly catered for.

- American-style buffet breakfast, including international favorites such as eggs and pancakes, with some à la carte Egyptian dishes.
- Buffet lunch, with a wide range of salads, cheeses, cold meats and Egyptian dishes plus a barbecue on one day, weather permitting.
- Afternoon tea with a selection of pastries, cookies and fresh fruit.
- A la carte dinner, with two or three choices per course – and a purely Egyptian menu on one of the evenings.
- Cooking classes with the head chef, learning to make Egyptian dishes such as kushari and om ali (a baked dessert of pastry, pistachios, raisins and coconut).
- Alcoholic and non-alcoholic drinks, plus choices from an extensive local and international wine lists at additional cost.

The Nile Location



Welcome to Southern Egypt, crucible of Ancient Egyptian culture. The River Nile wends its way more than 4,000 miles from Lake Victoria to the Mediterranean Sea. Yet it is the 130-mile section between Aswan and Luxor in southern Egypt that exerts the most powerful hold on the collective imagination. Here are many of the largest, most elaborate and intriguing structures built in ancient times, including the massive Temple of Karnak, the Valley of the Kings, the Valley of the Queens, the Temple of Kom Ombo, the Temple of Horus in Edfu, and the Greco-Egyptian shrine to Isis at the Philae temple complex, painstakingly reconstructed on an island after the original site was threatened by floods.

The river and landscape themselves possess an elemental beauty and, with A&K Sanctuary, your journey along and through them will be exclusive and enlightening. Arriving in either Luxor (a one-hour flight from Cairo) or Aswan (1 hour 30 minutes), relax during a private transfer by road (30 or 45 minutes respectively) to the exclusive docking area where you step aboard Sun Boat IV. Stopping at key archaeological sites en route from Luxor to Aswan – or vice versa – you will step ashore with an Egyptologist guide who will bring to life 5,000 years of history in the living outdoor museum that is the River Nile.

LUXOR

Home to more than half of Egypt's antiquities, Luxor – formerly Thebes, the capital of Ancient Egypt at the height of its glory – is the gateway to the Nile or the end point of the voyage. Visit the bustling market before touring its legendary archaeological sites.

LUXOR TEMPLE

Luxor honors “kingship”, rather than any deity. Alexander the Great claimed to have been crowned in the city, and he, Amenhotep III, Tutankhamun and Ramesses II built sections of the temple. Nearby were a legendary fortress and a seat of government in Roman times.

KARNAK TEMPLE

This vast complex of temples, pylons, chapels and other structures, including the Great Hypostyle Hall, was built between the Middle Kingdom and Ptolemaic periods. Some 30 pharaohs added works and structures to what is now a UNESCO World Heritage Site.

THE VALLEY OF THE KINGS

This historic burial ground for nobles and pharaohs, including Tutankhamun, is one of the world's key archaeological sites. Hidden within rocky cliffs, 63 decorated tombs showcase exquisite hieroglyphics, paintings and treasures, proof of royal belief in the afterlife.

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Aswan marks ancient Egypt's southern frontier

ASWAN

The gateway to southern Egypt since 2,000BC, Aswan still delivers astonishing finds. In recent years, archaeologists have uncovered a bust of the Roman Emperor Marcus Aurelius, a sphinx and 35 mummies in a tomb dating back to the Ptolemaic Dynasty.

PHILAE TEMPLE

This ravishingly beautiful Greco-Egyptian shrine to Isis, extraordinary in its own right, was made even more famous when, in 1971, it was relocated from its original site to higher ground on nearby Agilika Island when rising Nile waters threatened to submerge it.

KOM OMBO TEMPLE

Kom Ombo is remarkable for many reasons, not least its dramatic position, symmetrical design and dedication to two gods rather than one – crocodile-headed Sobek and falcon-headed Horus. The mummified reptiles in the Crocodile Museum are surprisingly moving.

TEMPLE OF EDFU

One of the best-preserved shrines in the whole of Egypt, the Temple of Edfu was built between 237 and 57 BC. Inscriptions on the walls give intriguing information about the myths, language and religions following the death of Alexander the Great in 323 BC.

SAILING A FELUCCA

An outing aboard one of these gracious traditional sailboats, nonchalantly piloted by a skipper with a bare foot on the tiller, is the most serene way to explore the waters around Elephantine Island, Lord Kitchener's Botanical Gardens, and the Agha Khan Mausoleum.

NUBIAN VILLAGE

Venture further south along the Nile to Sohail Island, in what was once Nubia – the region where the Kerma civilization, one of the oldest in Africa, flourished from 2500 BC to 1500 BC. Explore a time-warped village where Nubian culture is preserved, taking a camel ride through its alleys and meeting villagers in their colorfully painted homes. Optional experience. ASWAN TO LUXOR

DAY 1: A WARM WELCOME IN ASWAN

A traditional musical procession welcomes guests aboard Sun Boat IV, their five-star A&K Sanctuary riverboat, and sets the tone for this immersive trip in ancient and living Egypt.

After boarding via a private dock in Aswan – whose temples have stood guard over the Nile since the seventh century BC – the first post-lunch excursion is in a traditional felucca (weather permitting) for a sail around Elephantine Island, declared a World Heritage Site on account of its many archaeological digs.

Back on board afternoon tea is served in the lounge to the accompaniment of an oud trio, and the day is topped off by a gourmet dinner prepared by talented chefs.

DAY 2: EXPLORE TEMPLES OF PHILAE AND KOM OMBO

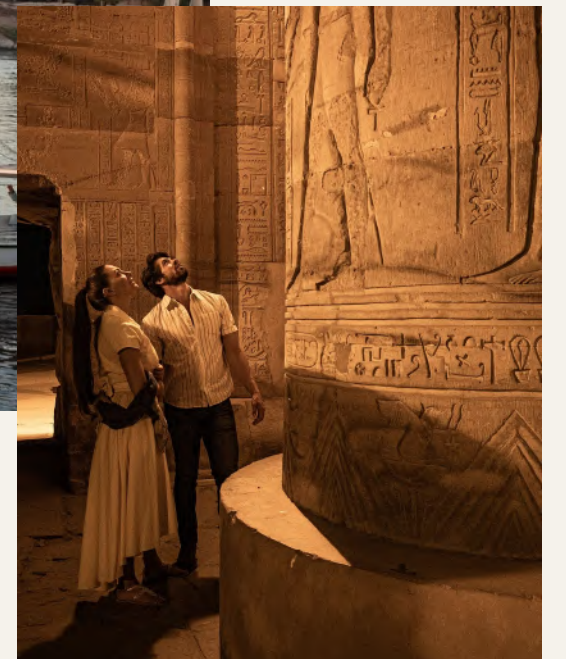
Agilika Island is the scene for the next archaeological discovery, where the nearby Philae temple complex was relocated and painstakingly reassembled to save it from floods created when the Old Aswan Dam was built. The hieroglyphic reliefs and a visit to the Granite Quarries that supplied most of the stone used to build pyramids are a highlight.

As guests enjoy lunch and afternoon tea, the riverboat cruises to Kom Ombo. That evening, visit the magnificent Temple of Kom Ombo, dedicated to the crocodile god Sobek. The day ends with a memorable dinner onboard, followed by a movie night.

ASWAN TO LUXOR

DAY 3: DISCOVER EDFU AND CULTURAL IMMERSION

Post breakfast, the day begins with a visit to the dramatic Temple of Edfu on the Nile’s west bank – one of the best-preserved shrines in Egypt, built between 237 and 57BC. Marvel at the inscriptions on its walls, which reveal much about language, myth and religion during the Hellenistic period in the country.

Back on board, guests can join an Egyptian cooking class, followed by afternoon tea, as the boat sails to the city of Luxor (formerly the ancient city of Thebes). It reads like a Who’s Who of ancient sites: the Temple of Luxor with its imposing obelisk, where an Egyptologist guide shares insightful stories; the iconic Valley of the Kings and the Queens, hidden away in the rocky folds of the landscape.

In the evening, guests enter into the spirit of local life as they dress in traditional galabeyya robes for an Egyptian Night on board, featuring a lavish dinner followed by dancing.

DAY 4: THE VALLEY OF THE KINGS EXPLORATION

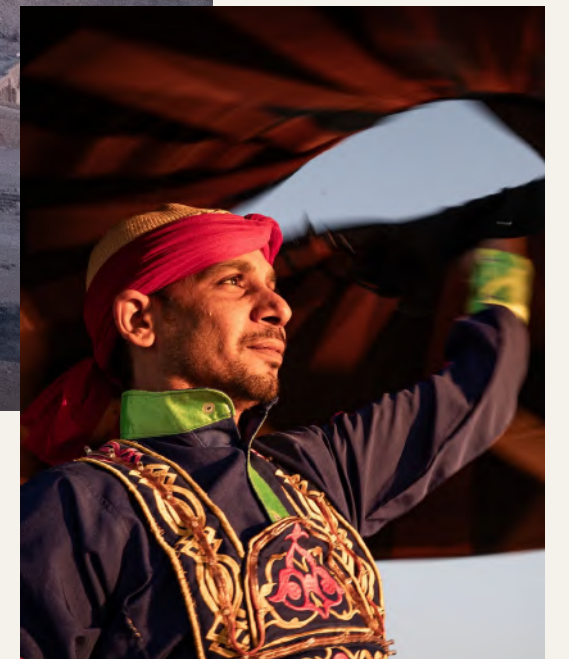
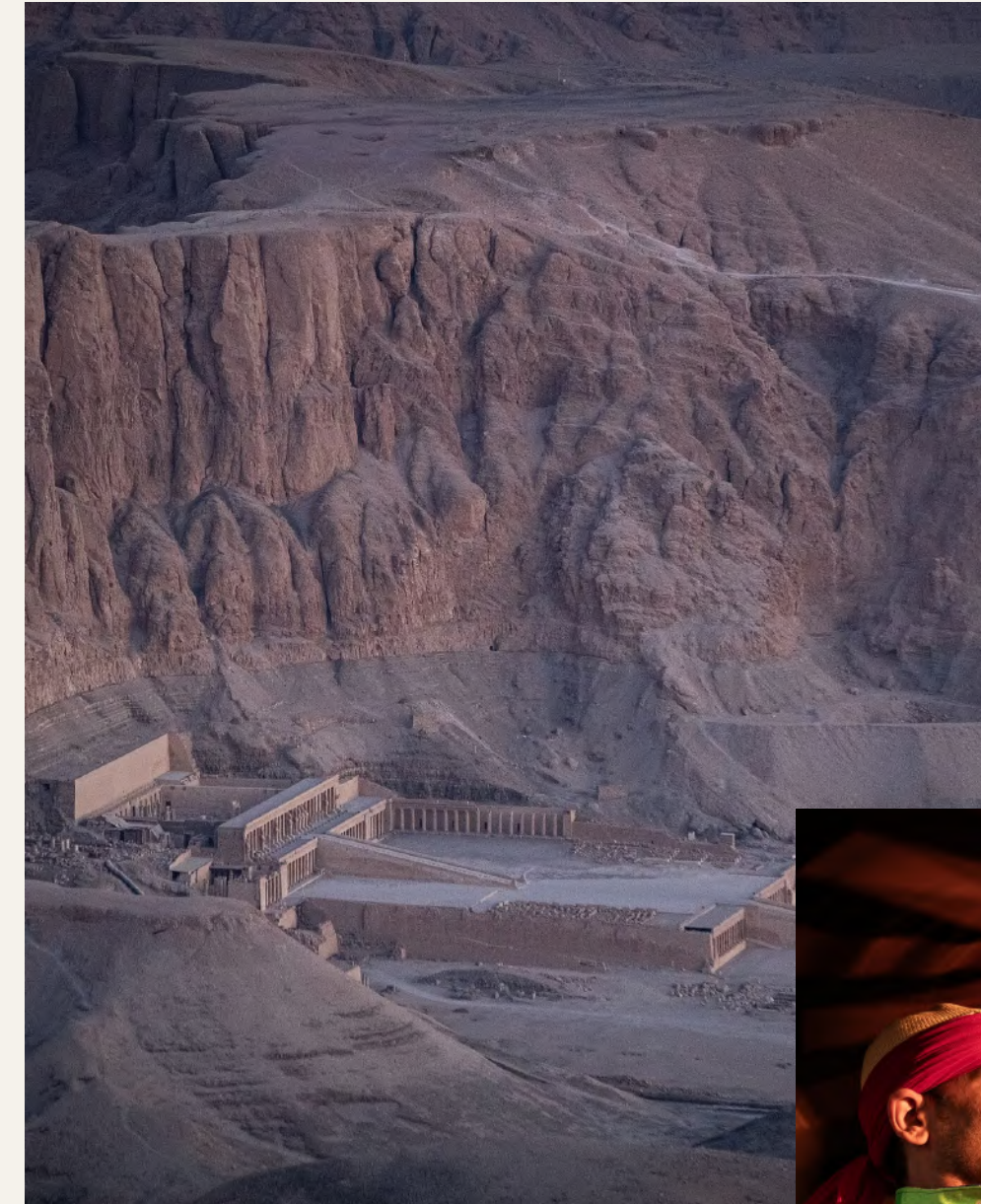
The jewel in the crown awaits today: the Valley of the Kings where, for nearly 500 years, some 65 rock-cut tombs and chambers were excavated for nobles and pharaohs, followed by a visit to the nearby Valley of the Queens and the Temple of Queen Hatshepsut.

The final archaeological showstopper is the Temple of Karnak, a complex of temples, pylons and chapels which guests explore with an Egyptologist guide.

Back on the boat, afternoon tea allows for some downtime. The voyage concludes with a gala dinner with white-gloved waiters serving gourmet cuisine, plus a dervish show.

LUXOR TO ASWAN



Welcome to an archaeological odyssey

Enjoy unique vantage points from the river



DAY 1: A WARM WELCOME IN LUXOR

A traditional musical procession welcomes guests aboard Sun Boat IV, their five-star A&K Sanctuary riverboat, and sets the tone for this immersive trip in ancient and living Egypt.

After boarding via a private dock in Luxor, guests embark on a post-lunch excursion to explore the East Bank of the Nile with an Egyptologist guide. Highlights include the Temple of Luxor, built from Nubian sandstone, and the Temple of Karnak – not a single building but a vast complex of temples, pylons and chapels.

Back on board afternoon tea is served in the lounge to the accompaniment of an oud trio, and the day is topped off by a gourmet dinner prepared by talented chefs.

DAY 2: VALLEY OF THE KINGS EXPLORATION

The archaeological odyssey continues with the jewel in the crown: the Valley of the Kings where, for nearly 500 years, some 65 rock-cut tombs and chambers were excavated for nobles and pharaohs, followed by a visit to the nearby Valley of the Queens and the Temple of Queen Hatshepsut.

On the way back to the Nile, guests pass the Colossi of Memnon – two massive stone statues of the Pharaoh Amenhotep III, which, in ancient times, were said to sing hauntingly at dawn.

Back on the boat, a leisurely lunch and afternoon tea allows for some downtime, as the riverboat cruises to the city of Esna. The day ends with a delicious dinner followed by a movie night.

DAY 3: DISCOVER KOM OMBO AND CULTURAL IMMERSION

JOURNEYS WITH PURPOSE IN EGYPT

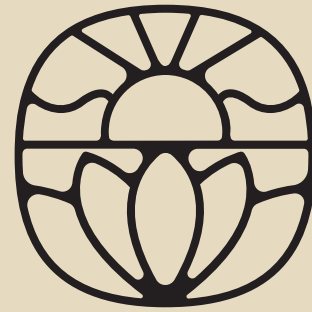

Here, around 50 students aged 4–15 engage in workshops on pottery, painting, gardening, theatre, and wellbeing, learning practical and artistic skills that prepare them for brighter futures. Since its founding in 2014, the program has empowered over 250 children and 100 women, transforming lives on Luxor’s West Bank.

Founded in 2009 by world-renowned heart surgeon Sir Magdi Yacoub, the Aswan Heart Centre provides free, life-saving cardiovascular care to Egypt’s most vulnerable patients. Supported by AKP, the center employs more than 370 doctors and nurses, combining advanced surgical facilities with pioneering research. Guests may take a guided behind-the-scenes tour, gaining insight into surgical theatres, family care programs, and cutting-edge imaging technology. With cardiovascular disease responsible for nearly half of Egypt’s deaths, the center’s impact is profound — offering hope, healing, and a brighter future to countless children and families.



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
